

The power of faith has transformed Shirdi, a tiny village in Ahmednagar, Maharashtra into a revered pilgrimage centre. Believers come here to pay obeisance to Sai Baba, the spiritual leader who made the village his home and lived here until he attained samadhi in 1918. The saint was known to perform miracles and spread teachings about One God. The 200 sq mts temple complex includes the Samadhi Mandir and the place where he once lived (Dwarkamai), Around 25,000 devotees visit Shirdi daily and the number of visitors shoots up to one lakh during festival days. The complex has facilities to make the experience a smooth one for pilgrims, such as Darshan Lane, donation counters, prasad counters, a canteen, railway reservation counter and book stalls. The Shri Sai Prasadalaya kitchen is the second largest in the country and serves thousands of devotees every day.

## FESTIVALS AT SHIRDI

Pilgrims pour into Shirdi in large numbers for the three festivals that are celebrated in a grand manner. Organised by the Shri Saibaba Sansthan Trust, this includes Ramnavami, Guru Purnima and Vijayadashmi. On these days, Shirdi resounds to the sounds of bhajans or devotional music. Religious ceremonies and readings from the scriptures (parayana) are part of the celebrations. Vibrant processions with chariots and palanquins wind their way through the streets. The Samadhi Mandir is open all night during festivals, with special events held the night before at Dwarkamai.

Visiting the temple complex is a spiritual experience. As you wander around the various buildings and holy spots, you will feel the connection with Baba in your heart and soul.

## SAMADHI MANDIR

The stone temple has a statue of Baba seated on a throne. Made of Italian marble. the life-sized statue is just behind the Samadhi. The marble railing around the Samadhi and two silver pillars in front of it are full of ornamental decorations.

### **DWARKAMAI**

Situated to the right of Samadhi Mandir, the two-level structure has portraits and relics of Sai Baba and items of everyday use that belonged to him.

### **GURUSTHAN**

Sai Baba arrived in Shirdi when he was a young boy in the form of a Bal Yogi and was first spotted seated under a neem tree in the village. Now known as Gurusthan, this area has a shrine and a portrait of the Baba.

#### **LENDI BAUG**

This small garden was created by Baba and it is believed that he watered it daily.






## **SHANI SHINGNAPUR** (75 KMS)


